Father!" ¹⁶it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, ¹⁷and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ—if, in fact, we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him. Thoughts

It was common for unwanted children to be used as slaves in the ancient world. Simultaneously, there were childless couples who were eager to adopt children and give them all of the rights, including to inherit, that their biological children would have received. The language of adoption in the Epistle to the Romans was powerful in Paul's society and can be in today's context as well. God offers to all of us, not a spirit of slavery, but adoption.

Thank God slavery is illegal in most of the world today, and yet it still rears its ugly head legally and illegally. Even right here in the Midwest, there are children from a wide range of backgrounds and ethnicities who are forced into labor and into commercial sex industries. Anyone can be targeted, but we know that young people experiencing poverty, bias, and separation from their families, are at greater risk of danger.

Most of the time, although not always, there is bipartisan support to create public policies that address the problems of human trafficking. However, we also hear contradictory messages. Some of our law makers who have voted for good laws specifically related to trafficking also support legislation that threatens food security and the general safety for young people.

In the next several months, many of us will attend candidate forums and town hall meetings. Let us remember to ask questions about where candidates and current law makers stand on policies related to hunger, climate and water, immigration, and juvenile justice that move children toward thriving rather than experiencing physical and unhealthy psychological vulnerability.

I am an heir with Christ. Try repeating that. To the children let us proclaim, "You are joint heirs with Christ," as a statement of faith and our resistance. Happy Monday!
