Jesus' words feel close during election time when we are reminded of the influence of money on politics. We have insufficient campaign finance restrictions and continue to live with a 2010 U.S. Supreme Court decision that gave constitutional rights, before meant only for individuals, to corporations, super PACs, etc. We expect money to have an impact on elections but have moved in the direction of its influence on steroids.

It isn't the fault of elected officials and new candidates running for office that they are part of a system that demands so much of their time fundraising. But some candidates give into the great temptation to create stories and lies based on the source of their campaign contributions, whether their financing is from secular or religious organizations.

It's more difficult to live in reality, make sense of the world, and embrace God's love for our neighbor believing political lies, so often entangled with money, than it is for a camel to get through the eye of a needle. Now, let us take time to check facts, pray for the grace to discern truth, and allow God's and our own forgiveness of ourselves and others when we learn we have made mistakes. Make a pledge to seek truth.
